

- 1. Layer another piece or overlap collage on top of original piece; use that same paper somewhere else on the page in another shape (either larger or smaller- NOT the same size)
- 2.Draw onto collage AND the background-lines, dashes, dots, etc
- 3. Hide part of the paper edge by adding paint and "blending" into the page
- 4. Use a color "wash or glaze" over collage and background; can wipe away some of the wash to create more interest
- 5. Use watered down paint and water or ink and "sprinkle" color onto collage and background
- 6. If you cut the paper and it is a hard edge, try using washi tape or deli paper to soften and blend; can add a torn piece on top of
- 7. Stencil over the collage and background either with paint or a texture paste
- 8.Dry brush white or a neutral color over collage and back ground
- 9. Be mindful of paper placement- consider using the rule of thirds for placement or the impact of orientation (horizontal vs vertical)
- 10.Be cognizant over imagery and types of papers being used. Sometime imagery can be too much.
